- In contrast to the rapidly growing elderly population, the 25 to 44 age group increased by only 2.3% between 1996 and 2001.

- The number of visible minorities in Brampton increased by 63.0% between 1996 and 2001.
- In 2001, the three largest groups of visible minorities in Brampton were South Asians (63,205), Blacks (32,070), and Filipinos (6,965).
- The three fastest growing visible minority groups in Brampton are the Latin Americans, South Asians, and Koreans.

- The number of people with English as their first language increased by 11.9%, while the number of those with non-English first languages increased by 47.7%.
- In 2001, the top five mother tongue languages after English were Punjabi, Portuguese, Italian, Spanish, and Chinese.
- The greatest population increase occurred among Urdu-speakers (150.9%), Punjabi-speakers (113.8%), and Spanish-speakers (77.6%).

- The number of single adults in Brampton (never/not yet married) increased by 25.1%, (from 60,075 to 75,150), between 1996 and 2001.
- Between 1996 and 2001, the number of legally married (and not separated) people in Brampton increased by 20.6%, (from 118,290 to 142,715 people).
- The number of widowed people increased by 24.3% between 1996 and 2001.
- The number of divorced or separated people increased by 23.1%, (from 17,860 to 21,985) in the same period.
- The widowed and divorced/separated groups in Brampton are increasing at a faster rate than the married group. However, the single, non-married population is growing faster than these groups themselves.

- In 2001, 8.3% of the Brampton population had achieved only a grade nine level of education or less; the comparative figure for Peel in 2001 was 7.6%.
- 34.5% of the Brampton population reported completion of high school as their highest level of education; the comparative figure for Peel in 2001 was 29.5%.
- 10.3% of the Brampton population reported their highest level of education to be certification in the skilled trades; the comparative figure for Peel in 2001 was 9.4%.
- 25.1% of the Brampton population reported their highest level of education at the college level; the comparative figure for Peel in 2001 was 24.5%.
- 21.7% of the population reported their highest level of education at the university level; the comparative figure for Peel in 2001 was 29.0%.
- 14.7% of the Brampton population (aged 20 years and above) reported having a Bachelor's degree or higher, compared to 20.7% in Peel.

- Overall, unemployment in Brampton declined between 1996 and 2001.
- In 2001, the labour force in Brampton consisted of 186,250 persons over age 15, an increase of 23.2% over the 151,195 persons in the labour force in 1996.
- The labour force participation rate for Brampton in 2001 was 74.8% compared to 74.3% in 1996. The comparative rate for Peel in 2001 was 73.5%.
- In 2001, there were 176,820 people employed in Brampton, an increase of 27.1% from the 139,090 employed people in 1996.
- Brampton's unemployment rate in 2001 for people aged 15 and over was 5.1%, down from the 1996 rate of 8.0%.

- The average family income in Brampton was \$74,263 in 2000, an increase of 20.7% from the average family income of \$61,516 in 1995.
- Overall in Brampton, families with higher incomes are growing at a faster rate than families with lower incomes.
- The highest rate of growth occurred among families that earned \$50,000 and over. This group increased by 40.7% between 1995 and 2000, from 43,485 to 61,170.
- In 2000, 67.4% of families in Brampton earned more than \$50,000 per year, compared to 59.6% in 1995.
- The number of families that earned less than \$20,000 declined by 1.3%, and the number of families that earned \$20,000 to \$49,999 increased by 1.3%.

- In 2000, there were approximately 35,045 persons in private households living on low incomes. The 35,045 low-income persons represented approximately 10.8% of the total population in 2000, compared to 13.6% in 1995.
- In 2000, there were 8,295 low-income families in Brampton. The 8,295 families comprised approximately 9.9% of the total number of families in Brampton, compared to 12.3% in 1995.
- In 2000, there were 5,875 unattached individuals living on low incomes in Brampton compared to 5,355 in 1995. They represented 29.5% of all unattached individuals in Brampton in 2000.
- There was a higher incidence of low income among unattached individuals than among families in 2000: 29.5% versus 9.9%, respectively.
