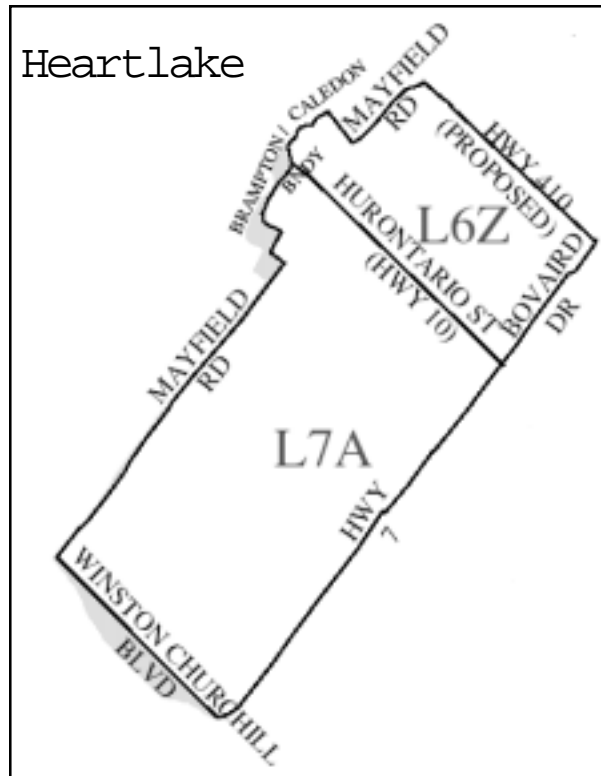

- The fastest growing age group in Heartlake is the 65 and over age group: 53.6% increase between 1996 and 2001.
- In contrast to the rapidly growing elderly population, the 0-14 age group increased by 12.5% between 1996 and 2001.

Highlights:

- In 2001, 12,625 or 32.5% of Heartlake's total population was comprised of immigrants, up from the 1996 figure of 30.5%.
- The immigrant population is growing at a faster rate than the Canadian-born (non-immigrant) population: 31.7% versus 20.4% between 1996 and 2001.

Highlights:

- In 2001, there were 11,430 visible minority persons living in Heartlake (compared to 7,290 in 1996).
- In 2001, 29.4% of Heartlake's population was comprised of visible minorities (compared to 23.2% in 1996).
- The number of visible minorities in Heartlake increased by 56.8% between 1996 and 2001.
- In 2001, the three largest groups of visible minorities in Heartlake were South Asians (4,510), Blacks (3,125), and Filipinos (735).
- The three fastest growing visible minority groups in Heartlake are the Koreans, Southeast Asians, and Latin Americans.

Highlights:

- The majority of Heartlake residents (73.2%) indicated that English was their mother tongue (first language).
- The number of people with English as their first language increased by 20.3%, while the number of those with non-English first languages increased by 39.3%.
- In 2001, the top five mother tongue languages after English were Punjabi, Italian, Portuguese, Chinese, and Spanish.
- The greatest population increase occurred among Polish-speakers (203.3%), Urdu-speakers (165.0%), and Spanish-speakers (130.6%).

- Between 1996 and 2001, the number of legally married (and not separated) people in Heartlake increased by 22.8%, (from 14,400 to 17,690 people).
- The number of widowed people increased by 31.9% between 1996 and 2001.
- The number of divorced or separated people increased by 44.5%, (from 1,505 to 2,175) between 1996 and 2001.

- In 2001, there were 9,480 couple families, an increase of 25.6% over the 1996 figure of 7,550.
- In 2001, 11.5% of families in Heartlake were lone-parent families.
- Male lone-parent families are growing faster than female lone-parent families.

- In 2001, 93.6% of the 10,860 private occupied dwellings in Heartlake were owned, and 6.4% were rented (compared to 91.7% and 8.3%, respectively in 1996).
- Home ownership in Heartlake increased by 30.8%, between 1996 and 2001, while no changes occurred in home rentals in the same period.

- 29.4% of the Heartlake population reported their highest level of education at the college level.
- 24.3% of the population reported their highest level of education at the university level.
- 16.5% of the Heartlake population (aged 20 years and above) reported have a Bachelor's degree or higher.

Highlights:

- Overall, unemployment declined between 1996 and 2001 in Heartlake.
- In 2001, the labour force in Heartlake consisted of 23,395 persons over age 15, an increase of 31.2% over the 17,825 persons in the labour force in 1996.
- The labour force participation rate for Heartlake in 2001 was 80.1% compared to 78.1% in 1996. The comparative rate for Peel in 2001 was 73.5%.
- In 2001, there were 22,305 people employed in Heartlake, an increase of 33.2% from the 16,740 employed people in 1996.
- Heartlake's unemployment rate in 2001 for people aged 15 and over was 4.7%, down from the 1996 rate of 6.1%. By comparison, in Peel in 2001, the unemployment rate was 5.1%.

Highlights:

- The average family income in Heartlake was \$86,492 in 2000, an increase of 25.0% from the average family income of \$69,569 in 1995.
- Overall in Heartlake, families with higher incomes are growing at a faster rate than families with lower incomes.
- The highest rate of growth occurred among families that earned \$50,000 and over. This group increased by 42.3% between 1995 and 2000, from 5,955 to 8,475.
- In 2000, 79.1% of families in Heartlake earned more than \$50,000 per year, compared to 71.5% in 1995.
- The number of families that earned less than \$20,000 increased by 8.5%, and the number of families that earned \$20,000 to \$49,999 decreased by 9.5%.

Highlights:

- The number of individuals in private households living on low incomes decreased by 4.0% between 1995 and 2000.
- The number of families living on low incomes increased slightly by 1.7% between 1995 and 2000.
- Overall, the incidence of low income among individuals in private households and families in Heartlake declined between 1995 and 2000.
- In 2000, there were approximately 2,395 persons in private households living on low incomes. The 2,395 low-income persons represented approximately 6.2% of the total population in 2000, compared to 8.0% in 1995.
- In 2000, there were 585 low-income families in Heartlake. The 585 families comprised approximately 5.8% of the total number of families in Heartlake, compared to 7.2% in 1995.
- In 2000, there were 295 unattached individuals living on low incomes in Heartlake compared to 170 in 1995. They represented 23.0% of all unattached individuals in Heartlake in 2000.
- There was a higher incidence of low income among unattached individuals than among families in 2000, 23.0% versus 5.8%, respectively.
