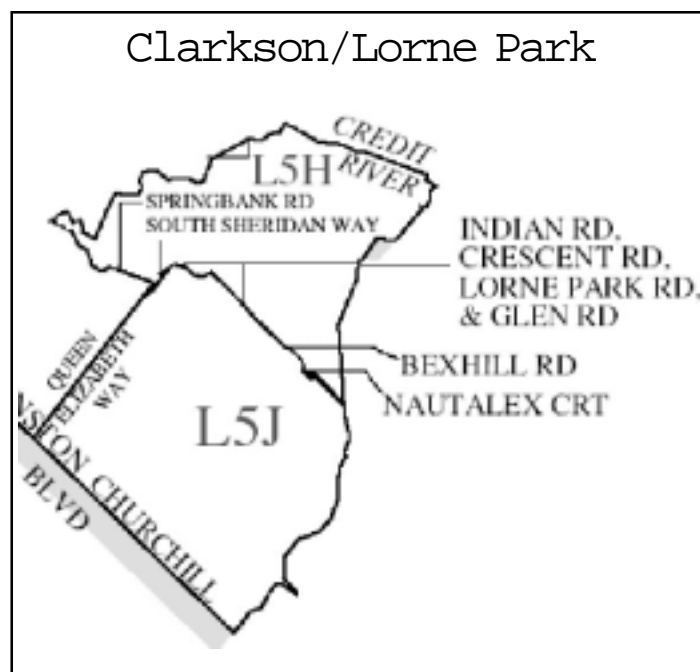

- Between 1996 and 2001, the population of Clarkson/Lorne Park only grew by 0.5%, while the population of Peel grew by 16.0%.
- The fastest growing age group in Clarkson/Lorne Park is the 65 and over age group: 18% increase between 1996 and 2001.
- In contrast to the rapidly growing elderly population, the 0-14 age group declined by 4.5% between 1996 and 2001.

Highlights:

- In 2001, 15,025 or 32.6% of Clarkson/Lorne Park's total population was comprised of immigrants, up from the 1996 figure of 29.6%.
- The immigrant population is growing at a faster rate than the Canadian-born (non-immigrant) population: 10.8% versus -3.6% between 1996 and 2001.

Highlights:

- In 2001, there were 8,600 visible minority persons living in Clarkson/Lorne Park (compared to 6,795 in 1996).
- In 2001, 18.7% of Clarkson/Lorne Park's population was comprised of visible minorities (compared to 14.8% in 1996).
- The number of visible minorities in Clarkson/Lorne Park increased by 26.6% between 1996 and 2001.
- In 2001, the three largest groups of visible minorities in Clarkson/Lorne Park were South Asians (2,160), Blacks (2,030), and Chinese (1,025).
- The three fastest growing visible minority groups in Clarkson/Lorne Park are the Latin Americans, Koreans, and South Asians.

Highlights:

- Most residents of Clarkson/Lorne Park (72.3%) indicated that English was their mother tongue (first language).
- The number of people with English as their first language declined by 4.5%, while the number of those with non-English first languages increased by 18.5%.
- In 2001, the top five mother tongue languages after English were Polish, Portuguese, Spanish, Italian, and German.
- The greatest population increase occurred among Korean-speakers (173.9%), and Urdu-speakers (157.1%).

- Movers from outside Canada represented 4.7% of the total population aged five and over in 2001, up from 4.3% in 1996.

Highlights:

- The number of single adults in Clarkson/Lorne Park (never/not yet married) increased by 5.4%, (from 10,330 to 10,890), between 1996 and 2001.
- Between 1996 and 2001, the number of legally married (and not separated) people in Clarkson/Lorne Park declined by 1.7%, (from 21,220 to 20,860 people).
- The number of widowed people increased by 14.4% between 1996 to 2001, while the number of divorced or separated people increased by 7.7%, (from 3,250 to 3,500) in the same period.
- Overall, the group of widowed people in Clarkson/Lorne Park is growing at a higher rate than all other groups.

- In 2001, there were 13,210 families in Clarkson/Lorne Park, compared to 13,055 in 1996. This represents an increase of 1.2%, or 160 families between 1996 and 2001.
- In 2001, there were 11,350 couple families, a decrease of 1.1% over the 1996 figure of 11,475.
- 14.1% of families in Clarkson/Lorne Park were lone-parent families in 2001.
- Female lone-parent families are growing slightly faster than male lone-parent families.

- In 2001, 76.7% of the 16,050 private occupied dwellings in Clarkson/Lorne Park were owned, and 23.3% were rented (compared to 72.8% and 27.2%, respectively in 1996).
- Home ownership in Clarkson/Lorne Park increased by 9.3%, between 1996 and 2001, while home rentals decreased by 11.3% in the same period.

- Clarkson/Lorne Park had 16,085 occupied private dwellings in 2001 with the majority (51.2%) being single-detached houses.
- Among apartments, those in apartment buildings with five or more storeys were the most common type in Clarkson/Lorne Park (14.7%) in 2001.
- In 2001, row houses accounted for 13.2%, and semi-detached houses accounted for 12.6% of the dwellings in Clarkson/Lorne Park.

- In 2001, 4.0% of the Clarkson/Lorne Park population had achieved only a grade nine level of education or less.
- 27.3% of the Clarkson/Lorne Park population reported completion of high school as their highest level of education.
- 8.7% of the Clarkson/Lorne Park population reported their highest level of education to be certification in the skilled trades.
- 24.8% of the Clarkson/Lorne Park population reported their highest level of education at the college level.
- 35.2% of the population reported their highest level of education at the university level.
- 26.4% of the Clarkson/Lorne Park population (aged 20 years and above) reported having a Bachelor's degree or higher.

Highlights:

- In 2001, the labour force in Clarkson/Lorne Park consisted of 26,395 persons over age 15, an increase of 1.3% over the 26,055 persons in the labour force in 1996.
- The labour force participation rate for Clarkson/Lorne Park in 2001 was 71.5% compared to 71.9% in 1996. The comparative rate for Peel in 2001 was 73.5%.
- In 2001, there were 25,045 people employed in Clarkson/Lorne Park, an increase of 3.7% from the 24,160 employed people in 1996.
- Clarkson/Lorne Park's unemployment rate in 2001 for people aged 15 and over was 5.1%, down from the 1996 rate of 7.3%. By comparison, in Peel in 2001, the unemployment rate was 5.1%.

Highlights:

- The average family income in Clarkson/Lorne Park was \$117,550 in 2000, an increase of 30.8% from the average family income of \$89,900 in 1995.
- Overall in Clarkson/Lorne Park, families with higher incomes are growing at a faster rate than families with lower incomes.
- The highest rate of growth occurred among families that earned \$50,000 and over. This group increased by 11.4% between 1995 and 2000, from 8,810 to 9,815 families.
- In 2000, 74.3% of families in Clarkson/Lorne Park earned more than \$50,000 per year, compared to 67.6% in 1995.
- The remaining family income groups decreased: the number of families that earned less than \$20,000 decreased by 30.6%, and the number of families that earned \$20,000 to \$49,999 decreased by 16.5%.

Highlights:

- The number of individuals in private households living on low incomes declined by 18.8% between 1995 and 2000.
- The number of families living on low incomes declined by 27.2% between 1995 and 2000.
- Overall, the incidence of low income among individuals in private households and families in Clarkson/Lorne Park declined between 1995 and 2000.
- In 2000, there were approximately 4,005 persons in private households living on low incomes. The 4,005 low-income persons represented approximately 8.7% of the total population in 2000, compared to 10.8% in 1995.
- In 2000, there were 885 low-income families in Clarkson/Lorne Park. The 885 families comprised approximately 6.9% of the total number of families in Clarkson/Lorne Park, compared to 9.5% in 1995.
- In 2000, there were 1,025 unattached individuals living on low incomes in Clarkson/Lorne Park compared to 995 in 1995. They represented 25.5% of all unattached individuals in Clarkson/Lorne Park in 2000.
- There was a higher incidence of low income among unattached individuals than among families in 2000: 25.5% versus 6.9%, respectively.
