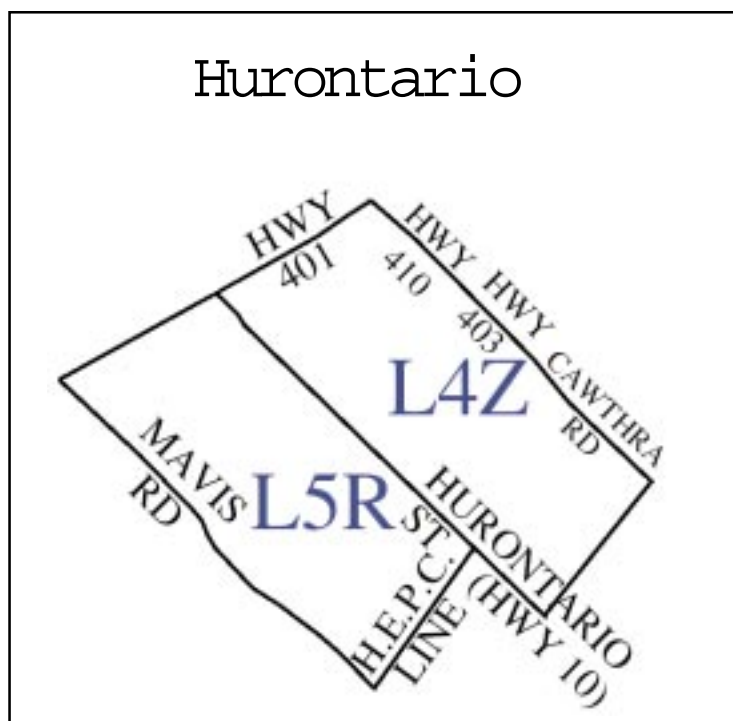

- The fastest growing age group in Hurontario is the 65 and over age group: 52.4% increase between 1996 and 2001.
- In contrast to the rapidly growing elderly population, the 0-14 age group only grew by 7.3% between 1996 and 2001.

- In 2001, 35,205 or 56.3% of Hurontario's total population was comprised of immigrants, up from the 1996 figure of 51.8%.
- The immigrant population is growing at a faster rate than the Canadian-born (non-immigrant) population: 28.9% versus 6.7% between 1996 and 2001.

- The three fastest growing immigrant groups in Hurontario are the Pakistani, Vietnamese, and Indian groups.

Highlights:

- In 2001, there were 34,310 visible minority persons living in Hurontario (compared to 24,975 in 1996).
- In 2001, 54.9% of Hurontario's population was comprised of visible minorities (compared to 47.3% in 1996).
- The number of visible minorities in Hurontario increased by 37.4% between 1996 and 2001.
- In 2001, the three largest groups of visible minorities in Hurontario were South Asians (12,625), Chinese (5,765), and Blacks (4,575).
- The three fastest growing visible minority groups in Hurontario are the Southeast Asian, South Asian and Arab/West Asian groups.

Highlights:

- Less than half of the residents of Hurontario (43.8%) indicated that English was their mother tongue (first language).
- The number of people with English as their first language increased by 6.5%, while the number of those with non-English first languages increased by 32.3%.
- In 2001, the top five mother tongue languages after English were Chinese, Polish, Punjabi, Portuguese, and Italian.
- The greatest population increase occurred among Urdu-speakers (171.9%), Vietnamese-speakers (122.2%), and Arabic-speakers (65.8%).

- Movers from outside Canada represented 9.6% of the total population aged five and over in 2001, up slightly from 9.5% in 1996.

Highlights:

- The number of single adults in Hurontario (never/not yet married) increased by 27.5%, (from 12,220 to 15,580), between 1996 and 2001.
- Between 1996 and 2001, the number of legally married (and not separated) people in Hurontario increased by 19.1%, (from 23,770 to 28,310 people).
- The number of widowed people increased by 32.1% between 1996 and 2001, and the number of divorced or separated people increased by 17.0%, (from 2,965 to 3,470) in the same period.
- Overall, the group of widowed and divorced/separated people in Hurontario is growing at a higher rate than the married group.

- In 2001, there were 17,125 families in Hurontario, compared to 14,260 in 1996. This represents an increase of 20.1%, or 2,865 families between 1996 and 2001.
- In 2001, there were 14,660 couple families, an increase of 17.8% over the 1996 figure of 12,450.
- 14.3% of families in Hurontario in 2001 were lone-parent families.
- Male lone-parent families are growing faster than female lone-parent families.

- In 2001, 77.3% of the 18,845 private occupied dwellings in Hurontario were owned, and 22.7% were rented (compared to 69.6% and 30.4%, respectively in 1996).
- Home ownership in Hurontario increased by 33.1%, between 1996 and 2001, while home rentals decreased by 10.6% in the same period.

- 23.6% of the Hurontario population reported their highest level of education at the college level.
- 34.9% of the population reported their highest level of education at the university level.
- 25.3% of the Hurontario population (aged 20 years and above) reported having a Bachelor's degree or higher.

Highlights:

- Overall, unemployment declined significantly between 1996 and 2001 in Peel.
- In 2001, the labour force in Hurontario consisted of 36,485 persons over age 15, an increase of 23.8% over the 29,475 persons in the labour force in 1996.
- The labour force participation rate for Hurontario in 2001 was 74.4% compared to 73.2% in 1996.
- In 2001, there were 34,460 people employed in Hurontario, an increase of 27.9% from the 26,945 employed people in 1996.
- Hurontario's unemployment rate in 2001 for people aged 15 and over was 5.6%, down from the 1996 rate of 8.6%.

Highlights:

- The average family income in Hurontario was \$72,453 in 2000, an increase of 23.1% from the average family income of \$58,879 in 1995.
- Overall in Hurontario, families with higher incomes are growing at a faster rate than families with lower incomes.
- The highest rate of growth occurred among families that earned \$50,000 and over. This group increased by 37.5% between 1995 and 2000, from 8,210 to 11,290.
- In 2000, 65.9% of families in Hurontario earned more than \$50,000 per year, compared to 57.6% in 1995.
- The number of families that earned less than \$20,000 decreased by 25.7%, while the number of families that earned \$20,000 to \$49,999 increased by 6.9%.

Highlights:

- The number of individuals in private households living on low incomes decreased by 15.4% between 1995 and 2000.
- The number of families living on low incomes decreased by 13.5% between 1995 and 2000.
- Overall, the incidence of low income among individuals and families in Hurontario declined between 1995 and 2000.
- In 2000, there were approximately 7,585 persons in private households living on low incomes. The 7,585 low-income persons represented approximately 12.1% of the total population in 2000, compared to 17.0% in 1995.
- In 2000, there were 1,860 low-income families in Hurontario. The 1,860 families comprised approximately 11.6% of the total number of families in Hurontario, compared to 15.9% in 1995.
- In 2000, there were 910 unattached individuals living on low incomes in Hurontario compared to 1,010 in 1995. They represented 25.0% of all unattached individuals in Hurontario in 2000.
- There was a higher incidence of low income among unattached individuals than among families in 2000: 25.0% versus 11.6%, respectively.
